Home Based Business

The City of Roseburg allows the establishment of Home Based Businesses (Home Occupations) under certain criteria. Residents within the city limits are afforded this opportunity through registering the proposed business and completing a Statement of Compliance.

Home Based Businesses or Occupations are established and based within a dwelling by members of a family that are occupying the dwelling with no non-family employees performing work. What this means is that the business cannot have employees who do not reside at the subject residence.

Many business opportunities today may not require the use of an office within an established commercial zone or professional office zone. However, operating a business within a residential zone must not create a situation where the residence takes on a commercial or office function. Neighbors are not expected to accept retail traffic or parking problems from employees or customers.

FILING FOR CANDIDACY FOR CITY OFFICE

For the 2002 general election in the City of Roseburg, there will be vacancies in the offices of Mayor and City Councilor, Position One, in each of the four wards. The positions of Mayor and Councilor are nonpartisan positions supported by petitions of nomination.

To qualify as a candidate for Mayor or City Councilor of the City of Roseburg, you must be:

a legal elector under the laws and constitution of the State of Oregon and a registered voter of the City of Roseburg;

a resident of the City of Roseburg for one year immediately before being elected to the office you are seeking.

If running for Councilor, you must also be a resident of the ward you seek to represent when you are nominated and elected, and when you assume office. If you are unfamiliar

with the ward boundaries, the City Recorder can advise you which ward you live in.

In order for your name to be placed on the ballot as a candidate for City office, you must obtain signatures from a certain number of electors supporting your candidacy. For the office of Mayor, nomination petitions must be signed by at least fifty City electors. For the office of City Councilor, nomination petitions must be signed by at least twenty City electors residing in the same ward in which you live. Nomination petitions must be filed with the City Recorder not less than seventy days before the election. The 2002 deadline for filing petitions is Tuesday, August 27, 2002.



In late June the City reached an agreement with owners of Town and Country Mobile Home Park to purchase the 15acre park for future airport related activities and expansion. The Park property was the last non-City owned property immediately adjacent to the active areas of the airport. The purchase will allow the City to pursue a number of Federal Aviation Administration grant related projects in the future.

FAA is funding 90% of the park purchase and will be working with the City over the next 3 to 5 years to relocate tenants from the park. Future projects include taxiway expansion and widening, additional t-hangers and space for future corporate hangers. There will also be room for potential public or private scheduled air service in this area if a carrier becomes interested.







The Fire and Police Departments both received invaluable training with City owned-houses that were slated to be cleared to make way for new business development. The Police Department benefited from tactical training exercises while the Fire Department used the houses for a Hazardous Materials drill, arson investigation training and ultimately live fire training.

Three houses were burned for firefighting training. Firefighters from Douglas County Fire District II joined the training with the entire Roseburg Fire Department. Four members of the media and two members of the City Community Development Department were given an inside look at fire behavior. The media was able to view the tactical operations of the firefighters, while Development personnel were able to see first hand fire reaction to different building construction methods.

A week prior to the live fire training each room in the three houses was set afire using different sources of ignition. The fires were carefully extinguished, and arson investigators attempted to determine the possible sources of ignition through the clues found inside the charred

Although the fires were set with back-up teams, safety officers and Incident Commanders in place, live fire-training remains dangerous. The value of live fire training for new and experienced firefighters will benefit the citizens of Roseburg. Textbooks cannot teach the sounds, zero visibility, extreme heat and teamwork that live fire training has to offer. The Fire and Police Departments are fortunate to have these opportunities made available to them.

New Law

A new state law that went into effect at the beginning of the year will now allow anonymous mothers to leave their unwanted babies in the custody of an agent, employee, doctor or other medical professional working at fire departments, police stations, and sheriff's offices before being turned over to the Oregon Department of Human Services.

Community Projects & Updates

Downtown Update

The facelift is continuing in Roseburg Town Center. A local contractor recently completed reconstruction of a number of ADA accessible intersection sidewalk ramps. City staff also installed another ten benches and trash receptacles to make shopping and dining more convenient in the Downton area. We are continuing to work with property owners to insure that new improvements fit in to the overall Downtown master plan.

To that end, one property owner recently constructed new upstairs apartments downtown for the first time in many years. We hope this will encoura other property owners to consider upstairs living units which will make downtown more diverse. Early this spring, new digital parking meters were installed on the 200 block of Jackson Street, as well as on Douglas Avenue. The new meters record tir more accurately and have a digital display so customers can see exactly how much time is remaining. In addition, a few meters with a ten-minute "free" tir option were installed on Jackson Street to better serve short-term customers and allow people an opportunity to make a quick stop without plugging t meter. We hope to continue replacing meters over the next four or five years until all the old style meters are replaced.



New Restrooms

The Parks Department will install two new restrooms for park users this summer. The restroo will be placed in Micelli Park and at the north end of the Wildlife Pond in Stewart Park. T restrooms will be constructed out of cinder block and contain hand washing and toilet faciliti. The restroom at the Wildlife Pond will be opened daily, while the restroom at Micelli Park will be availa for organizations using the softball field.

Trails For Sunshine Park



The Sunshine Park Master Plan includes the creation of a number of nature trails the 90-acre park. During the initial construction of the park, a one-half mile partrail was installed. The trail surrounds the seasonal creek and leads to the ball fiel. The Master Plan calls for additional trails leading to view points located on the hills overlook the park, offering views of Roseburg, Dixonville and surrounding hills and valleys.

Through various grant programs, Umpqua Training and Employment is able to provide you crews to government agencies, at no cost to the agency, while providing job opportunities young people. Through these job opportunities the youth of our community learn job ski develop positive work ethics, gain work experience and earn a wage while completing muneeded projects.

This summer, Umpqua Training and Employment, in partnership with the Parks Departme will provide a crew of young people to construct the trail. The crew, under the supervision an adult crew leader, will be working on the trail for eight weeks this summer.

The trail will begin at the east portion of the parking area and will end at a viewing area at twest hilltop. A bench will be placed at the end of the trail at the top of the hill. In the future an additional trail will be constructed to connect the highest hill on the eastside of the park.



Vine/Alameda/Oakland Project Update

The long awaited Vine/Alameda/Oakland Improvement Project is well underway. This project involves widening and improving Vine Street between Garden Valley and Alameda, Alameda Avenue between Vine and Sunset, and Oakland Avenue between Stephens and Vine. Each of these streets will be widened and have a new curb, gutter and sidewalk on each side of the street.

The contractor is currently installing underground facilities including a new large diameter storm line and a new water line on Vine Street. Construction is expected to continue through the summer and be complete by the beginning of October. This project is being paid for out of the Urban Renewal Agency funds, water utility, storm utility, sidewalk fund (hotel/motel tax) and the capital improvement fund.



loberts/Rice/Waite Improvements

The contractor has begun construction on the Roberts/Rice/Waite Improvement Project. The streets to be improved as part of this project include Roberts Street and Waite Street between Stephens and Jackson, Rice Street between Stephens and Main, and Cobb and Stephens Street tween Rice and Waite. The intention of the project is to install missing sections of sidewalk, install new lewalk access ramps, replace damaged sections of sidewalk, and widen and install curbs, gutters and sidealks on the unimproved blocks of these streets. As part of this project, a new 12-inch waterline will be stalled on Roberts Street and Stephens Street.

5, Rice, Waite, and Cobb Street will all have new asphalt surfaces upon completion. Construction is pected to be complete by October 1, 2002. This project is being funded by the sidewalk fund (hotel/motel kes), the water utility, the storm drainage utility and capitol improvement funds.

uilding Permits



The City receives a number of calls regarding when building permits are required. The following answers those frequently asked questions pertaining to permits.

hat is the purpose of the permits and codes?

ilding codes give reasonable assurance that a building is safe from structural ure, fire hazards from electrical and heating systems, electrical shock and is. Permits provide a permanent record of the work performed and inspects conducted on the project.

m planning a remodel of my home. by should I get a building permit?

is is a question many people may ask themselves when planning alterations their home. A decision not to get a permit could be a very costly one, me homeowners are finding when they try to sell or refinance their home, spective buyers or lending institutions want proof that alterations are in npliance with local codes. Without a permit and inspection on record, re is no proof. The homeowner must then apply for a permit with no trantee that the remodel will meet the codes and face the possibility that the nodel must be redone or removed. This is costly and frustrating and could se delays in financing or a lost sale of their home.

I need a permit for everything I do to my home?

If you have questions about what needs a permit and what does not, call Building Division at 440-1175.

take out a permit to remodel a home built ten years ago, I build to the code in effect when the home was originally it?

The new work must be constructed under the codes in effect today.

remodel my house, do I have to bring the entire home up the codes in effect today?

Only the new portion must meet the current codes unless the remodel ates a hazard for the existing building, such as overloading an existing m.


w long does it take to get a permit?

ne permits can be obtained immediately. Others require plan review by er departments and may take up to 10 working days.

Why do I need inspections? Do I have to pay for these inspections?

Inspections are required at various

stages of the project to see that the work is following the approved plans and codes. There is no additional charge for the inspections; they have been paid for with the permit fees.



To get an inspection, call the City Building Inspection Request Line at 541-440-9616 and leave the following information: address of the job site, the permit number, the type of inspection needed, when you would like the inspection, contractor or contact person and a contact telephone number. Inspection requests received before 8:00 a.m. will normally be done that same day. Requests received after 8:00 a.m. will be done the following workday. The Building Division will try to accommodate requests by homeowners to schedule a time for the inspector to meet them when necessary.

When do I need a plumbing permit?

The City issues plumbing permits to install or replace any plumbing fixture such as a sink, toilet, water heater or lawn irrigation system and if additional water or waste piping is installed or repaired.


When do I need a mechanical permit?

The City issues such permits for installation or modification of any heating or cooling system such as a furnace or air conditioner (except those installed in a window and plugged into an electrical outlet).

What about an electrical permit?

Electrical permits are issued by the State of Oregon Electrical Inspector through the Douglas County Building Department, Please call 440-4284.





2002 Pavement Management Projects

As part of the City of Roseburg's Pavement Management Program, sixty-eight streets will be getting "facelifts" this summer. The Public Works Department has been working closely with the City's pavement consultant to try and provide the most cost-effective pavement management program possible. The goal of this program is to preserve the existing streets within the City efficiently and economically.

There are three methods of pavement preservation that the City of Roseburg uses; overlays, slurry seals and chip seals. An overlay is the addition of 11/2 - 21/2" of asphalt over an existing paved surface. A slurry seal is a

very thin layer of aggregate with an asphalt emulsifier applied to a pave surface. A chip seal is a layer of asphalt liquid that is applied and then co ered with rock to form a new surface. Overlays and slurry seals are us primarily as preventative maintenance to prolong the life of the paved su face. Chip seals are used both for pavement longevity and to upgrade gra el sections. The degree of deterioration of a given street is evaluated determine the method used.

This year's program will focus on overlays and slurry seals. The following streets are scheduled for work this summer.

ORDINANCES & RESOLUTIONS

The following are the Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Roseburg City Council during the first six months of calendar year 2002.

"ORDINANCE": A written directive or act of a governing body. Ordinances have the full effect of law within the local government's boundaries, provided that they do not conflict with a state statute or constitutional provision. An ordinance has two readings at Council prior to being voted on by the Council. An ordinance becomes effective 30 days after the second reading, unless an emergency is declared which enables the Ordinance to become effective immediately.

"RESOLUTION": An order of a governing body; requires less legal formality than an Ordinance. Statutes or City Charter specify which actions must be by Ordinance and which may be by Resolution. For cities, revenue-raising measures such as taxes, special assessments and service charges are always imposed by Ordinance; fee amendments, however, are made by Resolution. Prior to adoption, a Resolution only needs to be read before the City Council once (by title only, if no member of the Council objects).

Noise Disturbance

allowed and not allowed. The following outlines the regulations contained in the Roseburg Municipal Code pertaining to noise.

Roseburg Municipal Code Section 7.02.140 addresses general noise disturbances within the city limits. The Code describes the type of noises that are prohibited and specifies the time (10:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m.) that the noise is prohibited.

The use of "sound producing or reproducing equipment between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. that is plainly audible within a dwelling unit that is not the source of the sound, or use of such equipment on public property or on a public right-of-way so as to be plainly audible 50 feet or more from the from the source of the sound..." is restricted. As an example, music coming from one house that is so loud that the next door or cross street neighbor can hear it inside their own house, is a violation.

The regulations relating to sound reproducing equipment on public property or on a public right-of-way could have a number of applications...from a late night gathering of concertgoers in a public park, to a vehicle on the road with a loud stereo. The key in both of these provisions is the time of day. Restrictions are in place from 10:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. so the same sounds occurring at 8:00 p.m., for example, would not be covered in this ordinance.

There is an exception to these provisions. It reads as follows: "The Police Chief may grant an exemption of this Section to allow a person reasonable use of public property or right-of-way to broadcast music or speech, by issuance of a loud speaker permit." So, an individual or group may apply for a Loudspeaker Permit through the Police Department if they have a particular need to exceed the limits of the ordinance. Issuance of the permit is, however, not guaranteed and is based on a number of factors such as location, type of activity and time of day. Suffice to say that someone applying for a permit for a "Rave" party in the middle of a residential street at 1:00 a.m. would likely be denied. On the other hand, a request for a permit for a rally at the Stewart

Park pavilion with an ending time of 10:30 p.m. would more likel approved.

The provisions address motor vehicle noises occurring between 10:00 and 7:00 a.m. It states: "Parking a motor vehicle with the motor or aux equipment in operation on a public right-of-way or on private propetween the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m., if the noise so produce plainly audible within a dwelling unit" (is prohibited). The Police Depart gets a number of complaints annually about "semi" tractors left idling all in a residential neighborhood.

There is an exception to this portion, also. It reads: "This Section sha apply to commercial construction equipment, to the normal operation of cles designed and used for commercial transportation of passengers, other vehicles being loaded or unloaded." So, a truck making a delivery neighborhood at 4:00 a.m. or a bus picking up passengers at 10:00 would be exempt.

The provisions also prohibit "Alteration, demolition, erection or repair o structure between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m."

This ordinance was not enacted to restrict the activity of citizens. Its put is to protect the general population from unnecessary noise and disturbated The Police Department will respond to complaints of violation of this nance and will usually ask the violator to comply and stop the noise. works most of the time. However, subsequent violations of a similar nay result in a citation.

Other laws, such as those addressing Disorderly Conduct, may also presome types of noise disturbances. These usually involve a specific beform an individual and require names of those disturbed and their willing to act as a complainant. These statutes are not specific as to time of darre not subject to the same restrictions as the city ordinance.
