ISSUE STATEMENT AND SUMMARY

The Homeless Commission was established in December of 2020 and began meeting in January of 2021. Council has asked for an update on the work of the Homeless Commission.

BACKGROUND

A. Council Action History.

December 14, 2020: Council adopted an ordinance to establish a Homeless Commission consisting of seven (7) members: Representatives from Adapt, United Community Action Network (UCAN), Aviva Health and Umpqua Health Alliance; and two at-large positions. The Mayor serves as Chair of this commission.

December 12, 2022: Council adopted an ordinance to add a representative from the Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians to the Homeless Commission.

B. Analysis.

The Homeless Commission began meeting in January of 2021 to research and make recommendations to the City Council on addressing the needs of the unhoused population. In March of 2021, on the Homeless Commission's recommendation, the City contracted with Rogue Retreat out of Medford to conduct an assessment of the homeless services available in our community. Their report was presented to the Homeless Commission on April 26, 2021.

Navigation Center: In June, 2021, the City was awarded \$1.5M to establish a navigation center by June 30, 2022. In addition, Umpqua Health awarded the City \$300,000 towards operation of the center. In February 2022, after an extensive search by a subcommittee of Homeless Commission members and staff, the City purchased property located at 948 SE Mill Street for use as a navigation center. After a request for proposals was unsuccessful in finding an operator, UCAN stepped up to offer their services. In March of 2022, the City entered into an agreement with UCAN to operate the center. Ten (10) pallet shelters were placed on the property and began serving as shelters in June of 2022. Since that time, the center has provided temporary shelter, along with wrap around

services, to nearly 30 people. Nearly half have moved on to permanent housing or other stable accommodations. In addition, the site provides walk-in support services for low-income and homeless residents.

Privacy fencing has been installed around the perimeter of the area with the pallet shelters, and abatement and demolition of the interior of the building is nearly complete. Renovation of the building to provide congregate shelter for an additional 30 people has begun and is expected to be complete by early summer. City staff has been managing this project.

In January, Oregon Housing and Community Services (OHCS) awarded grant funding to the City to help cover navigation center operating costs through June 2023.

Urban Campground: In November of 2022, the Homeless Commission agreed to move forward in looking for property for an urban campground. The campground would provide a legal place for homeless to camp. It was agreed that this type of urban campground would need to have an operator providing 24-hour supervision and oversight. At this time, funding for purchase of a site or cost of an operator has not been identified. Staff has researched vacant properties owned by the City and County, and under private ownership. A subcommittee consisting of Homeless Commission Chair Larry Rich, Homeless Commission member Shelley Briggs Loosley, City Manager Nikki Messenger and Assistant City Manager/Recorder Amy Sowa has done further research and visited several sites for consideration. Homeless Commission members have been asked to continue to explore possible sites and provide information to staff. At this time, a feasible site has not been identified.

Some things taken into consideration when looking at properties include:

- Topography. The land must be flat enough for people to pitch tents. The site cannot be located in a natural hazard area (prone to flooding and/or slides).
- Infrastructure: There needs to be power, water and sewer available to the site. Emergency service vehicles must be able to access the site.
- Proximity to schools and homes: The preference is to have a buffer between the urban campground and any schools or housing.
- Access to services. The site must have adequate transportation access to commercial, medical, and other social services and should have easy access to public transportation.
- Location: The site shall be in the Urban Growth Boundary and should be within the City Limits.


C. Financial/Resource Considerations.

ISSUE STATEMENT AND SUMMARY

The following information is being provided at Council's request regarding time, place and manner rules. No action is required.

ANALYSIS

Cities are allowed to impose city-wide prohibitions against persons sitting, sleeping, or lying in public, provided the city has a shelter that is accessible to the person experiencing homelessness against whom the prohibition is being enforced. Even if a city lacks enough shelter space to accommodate the specific person experiencing homelessness against whom the prohibition is being enforced, it is still allowed to limit sitting, sleeping, and lying in public places through reasonable restrictions on the time, place and manner of these acts ("where, when, and how") – although what constitutes a reasonable time, place and manner restriction is often difficult to define.

House Bill 3115 requires that any city or county law regulating the acts of sitting, lying, sleeping or keeping warm and dry outside on public property must be "objectively reasonable" based on the totality of the circumstances as applied to all stakeholders, including persons experiencing homelessness. What is objectively reasonable may look different in different communities. The bill retains cities' ability to enact reasonable time, place and manner regulations, aiming to preserve the ability of cities to manage public spaces effectively for the benefit of an entire community.

The City has published a survey and is seeking input from all stakeholders in the community regarding time, place and manner. The deadline for the survey is March 10. Results from the survey will be used to help determine which time, place and manner restrictions might work best for the City of Roseburg. Recommendations will be presented to the City Council at a future meeting.

Attached for reference is the current Roseburg Municipal Code Section 7.02.100 Prohibited Camping.

Roseburg, Oregon Municipal Code

Title 7 OFFENSES

Chapter 7.02 OFFENSES

7.02.100 Prohibited camping.

A. As used in this Section:

1. "Camp/Camping." To set up or to remain in or at a campsite, for the purpose of establishing or maintaining a temporary or permanent place to live/reside. Using or maintaining a fire or stove without other evidence of a temporary place to live/reside shall also be considered camping.
2. "Campsite." Any place where any indicia of camping is placed, established or maintained.
3. "Indicia of camping." Items or activities that may include, but are not limited to: any stove or fire or cooking activity outside of authorized areas; storage of personal belongings; use of tents, lean-tos, shacks, vehicles or any other temporary structures or any part thereof for sleeping or storage of personal belongings; designation of an area in a manner to exclude other members of the public by maintaining, using or storing personal belongings or items. Bedding (such as blankets, sleeping bags, or other sleeping matter), by itself, is not indicia of camping.

B. Except by permit issued by the Parks Department for camping in a City park, it is unlawful to camp in or upon any sidewalk, street, alley, lane, public right-of-way or any other place to which the general public has access, or under any bridgeway or viaduct.

C. No RV or campsite shall be used or occupied on any tract of ground within the corporate limits of the City except as provided in this Section.

D. No person shall use or occupy any RV or campsite for more than forty-eight hours on the premises of any occupied dwelling or on any lot which is not part of the premises of any occupied dwelling, unless a permit therefor shall have been first obtained as prescribed in the Land Use and Development Regulations, nor shall any person permit such use or occupancy unless the occupant of the RV or camp has obtained a permit therefor.

E. Exception. Overnight use of a camping vehicle or recreational vehicle (RV) as defined in ORS 446.310 (2) shall be allowed outside of a permitted or authorized campground, without a permit, provided the following conditions exist and are complied with:

1. The subject location is within a General Commercial (C-3) zoning district and contains a developed permitted use pursuant to Roseburg Municipal Code Subsection 12.04.010.
2. The property owner or lessee registers the subject location with the community development department and no fee is charged to the users;

3. The subject location is not within 500 feet of a residential structure;
4. The length of stay is limited to 48 hours;
5. The camping vehicle or RV unit is self-contained;
6. Generators shall not be used between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.;
7. The area designated for overnight use is paved with an asphalt or concrete surface;
8. The owner of the property where the overnight parking occurs has obtained the necessary permits or licenses, if any are required, from other governmental agencies.

F. Any person who violates this Section [7.02.100] shall be punished, upon conviction, by a fine of not more than \$250 for each violation. Conviction of a violation does not give rise to any disability or legal disadvantage based on conviction of a crime.



ISSUE STATEMENT AND SUMMARY

The following information is being provided at Council's request to outline previous/ongoing efforts made to address issues related to homelessness. No action is required.

BACKGROUND

The City Council has put a concerted effort into their goal to "Explore strategies to address issues related to unhoused individuals within the community". While there is much that remains to be done, the following is a brief outline of the work that has been accomplished to date.

- In 2019, the City completed a Housing Needs Analysis (HNA) to define local needs across the full spectrum of housing choices. As a part of the HNA and with funding assistance from The Ford Family Foundation, the City went a step further and commissioned the "Roseburg Homeless Population Study" to gain additional data about the people that are unhoused in our community and what their particular challenges/barriers may be. The report listed a number of recommendations that the City continues to implement. The HNA can be found here:

- The Council held a number of work-study sessions to hear from local service providers and learn more about existing services. The work-study sessions included a listening session for citizens to express their views and often, their frustrations related to this issue. Shortly thereafter, the Council worked with staff to accomplish the following:
 - Visited three Rogue Retreat facilities in Medford – Hope Village (tiny home village), the Kelly Shelter (low barrier congregate shelter), and the Urban Campground. This was a great opportunity for a contingent of Council and staff to learn, ask questions, and be inspired.

BACKGROUND/INFORMATIONAL

- Created a Homeless Commission with the goal of establishing a low barrier shelter, and more recently, an urban campground.
- Adopted updates to the Roseburg Municipal Code to make it easier for community partners to provide temporary shelter alternatives by allowing severe event shelters, tent camping and vehicle camping on private properties.

- Utilized CARES Act Funding to provide over \$200,000 in funding to local partners providing services to those living outside.
- Hired Rogue Retreat to do an assessment and help guide the next steps on addressing the unhoused.
- Received grants to develop the navigation center. Identified and purchased property, negotiated a contract with UCAN, installed the power and infrastructure to host 10 Mod Pods, hired an architect, initiated a Construction Manager/General Contractor selection process, awarded the CM/GC contract, completed the design, environmental remediation, and demolition, and are currently working on the renovation of the interior of the center.
- The Police Chief and Municipal Judge worked together to create a diversion program for homeless individuals cited with low-level offenses. Under the program guidelines, the judge will dismiss the citation(s) if the individual engages with services and meets goal(s) set by the individual and the service provider.
- Significant work goes into coordinating camp cleanup efforts that happen almost every week since the lifting of the previous Governor's executive order related to Covid-19.

In addition, considerable work is occurring to address the full spectrum of housing needs. Projects geared towards providing additional housing opportunities include the following:

- Adopted new "middle housing" code updates that address many of the high priority items outlined in the Housing Needs Analysis and meet the requirements of HB 2001.
- Preparing an application for an Urban Growth Boundary swap to remove steep, difficult (and expensive) to develop land and replacing it with flatter land located contiguous to the existing UGB.
- Offering multi-family housing incentives through the City's newest Urban Renewal Area. This program lowers the cost of developing multi-family housing in the area by paying the SDCs or public infrastructure development costs.

Roseburg

Homelessness is at a crisis level in Roseburg. In 2019, 260 individuals were found in the most recent Roseburg-specific point-in-time count to be unsheltered, in emergency shelter, or in transitional housing. Even though the needs have grown since the 2019 study, one provider of emergency shelter, the Roseburg Dream Center, has ceased operations. Prior to COVID, they provided up to 100 beds during severe weather events. Since COVID, they no longer provide shelter of any kind. Roseburg is not a HUD entitlement community, and outside of recent state funds, receives no funding to provide homeless services.

OUR WORK:

Roseburg has invested numerous local resources to address the impacts of homelessness in the community, including:

- Commissioned the Roseburg Homeless Population Study (2019)
- Formed the Roseburg Homeless Commission
- Purchased, began renovations, and provided operational funding of the Gary Leif Navigation Center
- Provide financial support for warming and cooling center(s)
- Working with ADAPT to start a crisis intervention team and sobering center (separate efforts)
- The police chief and municipal judge created a diversion program for homeless individuals cited with low-level offenses to better connect them with services in lieu of punishment
- Debris removal and camp cleanup
- Provide sanitation amenities, including porta potties & hand washing stations
- Updated city ordinances to allow private property owners to establish vehicle and tent camping areas and to allow accessory dwelling units

The purchase, renovation and operation of the Gary Leif Navigation Center received grant funding, but the project has a \$2 million deficit for renovation and operations through 2024. Roseburg strategically partners with United Community Action Network (UCAN), Umpqua Health Alliance (CCO), the Cow Creek Band of Umpqua Tribe of Indians, Douglas County, Adapt Integrated Health Services, Aviva Health, Neighborworks Umpqua and others to increase housing stability and address homelessness in the region. Roseburg partnered with the Roseburg Senior Center and others to use its ARPA funding to financially support a warming and cooling center during severe weather events. Despite all of the programs, services and shelters being provided, too many of Roseburg's resident remain homeless, and without additional state funding, the city will not be able to assist these community members.

STATE FUNDING NEEDED:

Locally, Roseburg has invested significant resources over the past three years, yet sustained state funding is needed to address the impacts of homelessness on our communities and connect our residents with shelter, supportive services, and stable housing. The impact of Oregon's homeless crisis is straining our communities. Local leaders cannot do this work alone. **Increased and consistent State funding** will help local governments plan for and meet the growing demand for services in the region and save public resources.

OUR PLAN:

Roseburg will receive \$957,560 under the Taskforce's proposal. The city will use these funds to help pay for the operation of the Gary Leif Navigation Center. This includes providing support services for individuals and families experiencing homelessness, including housing navigation, medical, behavioral health, and mental health care. Navigation center staff will ensure culturally appropriate programs that stabilize individuals and families through food assistance, supportive service information, and referrals.

CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION REQUEST:

Roseburg received a generous state grant to start a navigation center and begin operations. Roseburg purchased property with an existing building, hired an operator to run the center and coordinate wrap-around services, installed ten Mod Pods, and a shower/restroom trailer on the property.

The city received a cost estimate to renovate the navigation center in order to enable the center to provide additional services on-site and to shelter an additional 30 individuals and families. The current estimate to complete the renovation is \$1,270,424. The city does not have the funding in place to complete this project and is requesting **\$1.2 million in capital funds. Currently, the center is at capacity and had a waitlist of 50 people two days after it opened. This project would provide much needed additional housing for the community.**

Roseburg is currently partnering with the local Continuum of Care, UCAN, to operate the navigation center. Other partners include the Umpqua Health Alliance (CCO), Aviva Health, Adapt Integrated Health Services, and other local providers to ensure wrap-around services are provided to the consumers at the navigation center.
