With just three weeks left in the Summer Reading Program, I am inhaling titles to complete the 30-book reading log for adults.

Thanks to a nudge from book group member Linda, I just reread "The Remains of the Day" by Kazuo Ishiguro, which fits the category "A book by a Nobel Prize-winning author."

Revisiting this novel of a man reminiscing on his life as the butler at Darlington Hall in 1920s and 1930s England was pure joy.

Stevens has served with distinction and dignity – through the death of his father, the intrigue of Lord Darlington's clandestine meetings with Nazi officials and the deeply significant relationship with Darlington Hall's housekeeper, Miss Kenton – but at a high personal cost.

If you enjoy brilliant character studies that explore themes of regret and duty, this may be the book for you. Plus, it was adapted into an extraordinary movie starring Anthony Hopkins and Emma Thompson.

Thanks to a nudge from book group member Pat, I finally read the classic "Things Fall Apart" by Nigerian writer Chinua Achebe, which fits the category "A book set in an African country."

If you are interested in the clash between tradition and change and the effects of colonization, you may enjoy this novel featuring Okonkwo, who has made a name for himself as a powerful man in his community despite his humble beginnings.

The book begins with descriptions of the Igbo people and their customs. Christian missionaries and European colonizers then enter the scene, and the Igbo people's world is forever changed. Okonkwo's fate is especially tragic.

"Things Fall Apart" is the first novel in The African Trilogy. "Arrow of God" and "No Longer at Ease" continue the storyline.
